





Part 2 Programs are federally assisted² programs.³ In general, Part 2 Programs are prohibited from disclosing any information that would identify a person as having or having had a SUD unless that person provides written consent. Part 2 specifies a set of requirements for consent forms, including but not limited to the name of the patient, the names of individuals/entities that are permitted to disclose or receive patient identifying information, the amount and kind of the information being disclosed, and the purpose of the disclosure (see §2.31).v729 0 Td[(A)5.7(3(I)51.97(Fr)2.8(edr)-4.

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
